SECTION 2

GENERAL

2.1 Purpose

The Civil Aviation Authority is responsible for establishing emergency plans and procedures to deal with all unusual occurrences at the airports, including aircraft accidents and incidents, acts of terrorism, structural fires, and natural disasters. It also has the responsibility for ensuring the provision of maximum aircraft/airport emergency services and mutual aid.

Each service and agency has a number of duties to perform in the event of an accident or incident whether it be a minor or serious one. Obviously, minor occurrences do not require the full response of every service, or every member of the affected service. However, it is essential that each service required to respond do so proportionately on every occasion.

The Civil Aviation Authority must ensure that all participating services and agencies are familiar with their individual duties and responsibilities in this emergency plan. They must be familiar with duties of other participating services.

The purpose of the Airport Emergency Plan is to ensure that there is:

- a) Orderly and efficient transition from normal to emergency operations.
- b) Correct delegation of emergency responsibility
- c) Correct assignment of emergency authority.
- d) Coordination of efforts by participating services to cope efficiently and effectively with the emergency.

Individual unit emergency instructions are appended to this plan. These are not necessarily comprehensive but indicate to others the roles to be performed by each unit either singularly or collectively

2.2 Participating Agencies

The emergency procedures contained in this plan details the coordinated response and participation of services and agencies whose assistance, in the opinion of the CAA, is vital to appropriate emergency situations. Such services include.

2.3 Identification

Officers-in-charge of various emergency services shall identify themselves with hard hats and reflective vests of the colors listed below with appropriate lettering

Red (white lettering) Chief Fire Officer
Blue (white lettering) Police Chief

White (red lettering) Medical Coordinator
Orange (white lettering) Airport Authority
Lime Green (white lettering) Transportation Officer

Dark brown (white lettering) Forensic Officer

Personnel from the vanous participating emergency services may be identified by their unit's uniform. Volunteers without appropriate identification will be issued "Orange Arm Bands by the Officer-in-Charge of the manpower pool."

SECTION 3

TYPES OF EMERGENCIES

3.1 Aircraft Accident

When an aircraft accident has occurred or is imminent, on or off the airport.

3.2 Full Emergency

When an aircraft is, or is suspected to be, in such trouble that there is a possibility of an accident.

3.3 Local Standby

When an aircraft approaching the airport is known or is suspected to have developed some defect but the trouble is not such as would normally involve any serious difficulty in effecting a safe landing.

3.4 Bomb Threat

When an aircraft, airport building or a building in the vicinity of the airport is subjected to a bomb threat.

3.5 Unlawful Seizure (hijacking)

When an aircraft is subjected to unlawful seizure.

3.6 Structural Fire

When any fire on the airport, or fire within the vicinity of the airport, affect or could affect aircraft or airport operations.

3.7 Natural Disasters

When the airport is threatened by a potential natural disaster or has been subjected to any natural disaster.

3.8 Dangerous Goods

When an accident or incident has occurred involving dangerous goods.

3.9 Power Failure

When a power failure has occurred which affects aircraft and or airport operations.

SECTION 4

RESPONSIBILITY OF PARTICIPATING SERVICES FOR EACH TYPE OF EMERGENCY

4.1 Cayman Islands Air Traffic Services

4.1.1 Aircraft Emergencies

In the event of an aircraft emergency, the air traffic services shall be responsible for contacting the airport rescue and fire fighting service and other support services required, and provide essential details needed to deal with the emergency. If normal aircraft operations are to be interrupted, the air traffic services shall take action as necessary in respect of aircraft desiring to land or depart.

4.1.2 Bomb Threat

Air traffic control shall notify the police, the aircraft operator and other services listed in their response procedures. Appropriate action must be taken as directed in the ATC Manual of Operations. Such incidents will be controlled by the Commissioner of Police or his designated representative, however, the views of the pilot - in - command must be respected at all times

4.1.3 Unlawful Seizure (hijacking)

As in 4.1.2 above.

4.1.4 Structural Fire

Air traffic control shall take action as necessary in respect of aircraft arriving and departing.

4.1.5 Dangerous Goods

Air traffic control shall, if known, alert all emergency services to such dangers.

4.1.6 Natural Disasters

The air traffic services shall take action as necessary to alert aircraft operators and other relevant air traffic services units of such dangers. The air traffic control tower shall remain manned until ordered closed by the Director of Civil Aviation. After the threat has passed, the air traffic services shall take necessary action to advise all

accordingly.

4.1.7 Power Failure

The air traffic services is responsible for immediately notifying the appropriate personnel as laid down in their response procedures. Necessary action must be taken in respect of aircraft desiring to land or depart.

4.2 Cayman Islands Fire Service

4.2.1 Aircraft Accident

The prime responsibility of the airport rescue and fire fighting personnel is to save lives. To this end, concentration will be airmed at controlling fires that threaten life in order to provide a safe egress for the occupants of the aircraft, and assist in their evacuation and rescue. Property endangered by aircraft incidents and accidents will be preserved as far as is practicable.

Their responsibility shall also include:

- a) Control of the incident until the fire has been controlled.
- b) To establish and man an "Incident Post" until relieved by the police.
- c) To designate and establish a "Triage Area. "

4.2.2 Full Emergency

Place the airport fire service personnel on alert and respond to the designated staging areas.

4.2.3 Local Standby

Place the airport fire service personnel on alert.

4.2.4 Bomb Threat

4.2.4.1 Bomb Threat (aircraft)

The airport fire service will respond and remain at a safe distance until the threat has passed or other appropriate action is required.

4.2.4.2 Bomb Threat (airport building)

The domestic fire service will respond and assist with the evacuation of persons from

the building.

4.2.5 Unlawful Seizure (hijacking)

The airport fire service will respond as it would for a "local standby "unless other appropriate action is required.

4.2.6 Structural Fire

The domestic fire service will respond and take appropriate action as deemed necessary by the officer-in-charge.

4.2.7 Dangerous Goods

As in 4.2 6 above.

4.2.8 Natural Disasters

The airport fire service will provide available equipment and manpower to assist with securing airport property and the re-opening of the airport.

4.2.9 Power Failure

The airport fire service will assist with available equipment and manpower as requested.

4.3 The Royal Cayman Islands Police

4.3.1 Aircraft Accident

The police is responsible for rapid and effective control of the accident site. Their duties shall include:

- a) To establish congestion-free ingress and egress roads for emergency vehicles.
- b) To establish an "Incident Post" on site and liaise with other services and units to determine the needs of all concerned.
- c) To establish and control a "Manpower pool" and deploy personnel and equipment as necessary.
- d) To secure the site and provide crowd control, allowing access only to authorized persons.
- e) To cordon off the area for preserving it undisturbed, as far as practicable, for investigation purposes.

- f) To secure evidence, including the taking of photographs and statements, and ensure that markers replace bodies or articles that may have to be removed.
- g) To make provisions for temporary morgues as may be necessary.
- h) To organize and spearhead search parties both on land and at sea.
- I) To establish a " Casualty Bureau " and record details of all persons on board the aircraft, and details of the deceased and injured whether in the aircraft or on the ground.

4.3.2 Full Emergency

Place officers on alert and respond as may become necessary.

4.3.3 Local Standby

As in 4.3.2 above.

4.3.4 Bomb Threat

4.3.4.1 Bomb Threat (aircraft)

Respond to the airport and take appropriate action as detailed in the police contingency plans. The Commissioner of Police or his designated representative will take control of the incident.

4.3.4.2 Bomb Threat (airport building)

Assist with the evacuation of the building and cordon off the area. Take appropriate action as detailed in the police contingency plans.

4.3.5 Unlawful Seizure (hijacking)

As in 4.3.4.1 above.

4.3.6 Structural Fire

Provide assistance as may be required with respect to crowd control, unrestricted movement of emergency vehicles and securing the area.

4.3.7 Dangerous goods

As in 4.3.6 above.

4.3.8 Natural Disasters

Take action as detailed in the police contingency plans.

4.3.9 Power Failure

Assist with available equipment and man power as may be requested.

4.4 The Cayman Islands Hospital and Clinics.

4.4.1 Aircraft Accident

The primary responsibility of the medical service is to provide thage, first aid and medical care. Their responsibilities shall also include:

- a) To provide medical personnel and equipment.
- b) To provide and attach triage tags to the casualties appropriately.
- c) To establish, in coordination with the fire officer- in- charge, a " Casualty Clearance area."
- d) To provide for the transportation and accounting of casualties to designated facilities.

4.4.2 Full Emergency

Place appropriate personnel on alert.

4.4.3 Local Standby

As in 4.4.2 above.

4.4.4 Bomb Threat

Take action as detailed in the hospital contingency plans.

4.4.5 Unlawful Seizure (hijacking)

Respond appropriately to the airport and report to the emergency operations centre.

4.4.6 Structural Fire

Respond as required.

4.4.7 Dangerous Goods

As in 4.4.6 above

4.4.8 Natural Disasters

As in 4.4.4 above.

4.4.9 Power Failure

Not applicable.

4.5 The Civil Aviation Authority

4.5.1 Aircraft Accident

The Civil Aviation Authority is responsible for ensuring that the appropriate procedures of the airport emergency plan has been put in motion. The responsibilities of the Civil Aviation Authority shall include:

- a) To assist with the preparation and the operation of the "Incident Post."
- **b)** To organize sheltered areas for survivors and rescue workers, as well as general welfare requirements.
- c) To make decisions on continued aircraft operations.
- **d)** To seek any necessary assistance from overseas agencies, in consultation with the appropriate authorities.
- e) To arrange for accommodation of action planning committees and press releases.
- f) To issue briefings, in consultation with the Police, Fire Service, Hospital and airline involved, to the Cayman Islands Government Information Service for release to the press.

4.5.2 Full Emergency

Place all appropriate personnel on alert, analyze the emergency at hand and take appropriate action.

4.5.3 Local Standby

As in 4.5.2 above.

4.5.4 Bomb Threat

The Civil Aviation Authority shall ensure that the appropriate contingency plans have been put in motion. Their responsibility shall also include:

- a) To assist the Commissioner of Police in any way possible.
- b) To provide facilities for action planning committees.
- c) To make decisions, in consultation with other appropriate authorities, on continued aircraft and airport operations.

4.5 Unlawful Seizure (hijacking)

As in 4.5.4 above.

4.5.6 Structural Fire

Ensure that evacuation procedures are implemented and an account made of all persons with respect to buildings occupied or controlled by the Civil Aviation Authority shall make decisions with respect to continued aircraft and airport operations.

4.5.7 Dangerous Goods

Take action as deemed necessary.

4.5.8 Natural Disasters

The Director of Civil Aviation shall provide for the security of all Civil Aviation Authority property. He shall also make decisions with respect to continued aircraft and airport operations.

4.5.9 Power Failure

Ensure that contingency plans are in place for dealing with such emergencies.

4.6 Private Medical Services

4.6.1 Aircraft Accident

Provide available personnel and equipment as requested by the medical officer-incharge.

4.6.2 Full Emergency

Alert appropriate personnel and respond as necessary.

4.6.3 Local Standby

Not applicable.

4.6.4 Bomb Threat

As in 4.6.2 above.

4.6.5 Unlawful Seizure (hijacking)

As in 4.6.2 above.

4.6.6 Structural Fire

Provide available personnel and equipment as requested.

4.6.7 Dangerous Goods

As in 4.6.6 above.

4.6.8 Natural Disasters

As in 4.6.6 above.

4.6.9 Power Failure

Not applicable.

4.7 Aircraft Operators and Handling Agents

4.7.1 Aircraft Accident

A senior aircraft operator representative will report to the command post to coordinate the aircraft operator activities with the officer-in-charge. Their responsibilities shall include the following:

- a) To provide relevant details of aircraft information such as number of persons on board, fuel and carriage of any dangerous goods.
- b) To make arrangements for any uninjured survivors who may require to continue on their journey, or need accommodation or other assistance.
- c) For contacting deceased passengers next of kin.

4.7.2 Full Emergency

Provide details of aircraft information such as number of persons on board, fuel and

carriage of dangerous goods.

4.7.3 Local Standby

As in 4.7.2 above.

4.7.4 Bomb Threat

Their responsibilities shall include:

- a) To provide details of aircraft information such as number of persons on board, fuel and dangerous goods.
- b) To liaise with the Commissioner of Police and cooperate with him in any way possible.

4.7.5 Unlawful Seizure (hijacking)

Their responsibilities shall include.

- a) To provide relevant details such as composition and number of crew, number of persons on board, fuel, aircraft emergency exits and carriage dangerous goods.
- **b)** To liaise with the Commissioner of Police and cooperate with him in any possible.

4.7.6 Structural Fire

Make appropriate arrangements with respect to the scheduling of arriving and departing aircraft and provide assistance for their passengers as necessary.

4.7.7 Dangerous Goods

Provide details such as type, quantity and location of such dangerous goods.

4.7.8 Natural Disasters

As in 4.7.6 above.

4.7.9 Power Failure

As in 4.7.6 above

4.8 Civil Aviation Authority Airport Security.

4.8.1 Aircraft Accident

Provide security with respect to authorized access only to the restricted areas of the airport, and assist with the manpower and other security matters as may be directed by the Director of Civil Aviation. Inform Airport Maintenance Unit of aircraft accident stating: Aircraft accident, type of aircraft (if known), location of accident. Remain in radio contact with other CAA units. Liaise with RCIP officer.

4.8.2 Full Emergency

Place officers on alert and man the appropriate accesses. Inform Airport Maintenance Unit of emergency. Remain in radio contact with other CAA units.

4.8.3 Local Standby

Place officers on alert. Inform Airport Maintenance Unit. Remain in radio contact with other CAA units.

4.8.4 Bomb Threat

4.8.4.1 Bomb Threat (aircraft)

As in 4.8.1 above.

4.8.4.2 Bomb Threat (airport building)

Inform Airport Maintenance unit, liaise with RCIP officers and assist with the evacuation of the building, and account for persons occupying the building.

4.8.5 Unlawful Seizure (hijacking)

As in 4.8.1 above.

4.8.6 Structural Fire

As in 4.8.1 above.

4,8.7 Dangerous Goods

As in 4 8.1 above.

4.8.8 Natural Disasters

Liaise with Airport Maintenance Unit and assist as necessary. Provide security with respect to all airport property, and assist with manpower and other security matters as may be directed by the Director of Civil Aviation.

4.8.9 Power Failure

Responsibilities shall include

- a) To contact the appropriate personnel.
- b) To provide general security with respect of all airport property.
- c) To provide authorized access only to the " Air side " of the airport.
- d) To assist with manpower and other security matters as may be directed by the Director of Civil Aviation.
