1. REFERENCES:

This request supersedes my earlier survey request dated 6 November 1974. A more comprehensive survey is considered relevant at this time due to the fact that Emergency Relief Operations, hereafter referred to as the Operation, re-organized in late 1974 (IC/74/167 refers), has gained some experiences which need to be reviewed, and that the last Executive Board requested the DG, inter alia, "to formulate plans to enable Member States to cope with the health and other needs of populations during the recovery and rehabilitation stages following a natural or other disaster," thus enlarging the scope of the activities of the Operation; (EB55.R.62).

2. PROBLEMS:

In my view, one of the most serious problems in the Operation is the fact that it is too dependent upon individuals and does not function as a system. The difficulties experienced in early 1975 during the absence of Mr Idreos and myself demonstrate the point.

3. OBJECTIVES:

Accordingly, the survey objectives should be:

- a. To assist the Operation in,
 - i) defining its objectives and priorities;
 - ii) formulating a long-term plan which would interface with the overall coordination mechanism of the UN system and other organizations in emergency relief operations,
 - iii) identifying appropriate organizational methods.
- b. To recommend a viable system capable of responding effectively to the needs of emergency relief and rehabilitation under defined objectives.
- c. To determine the workload and number of supporting staff required by the Operation, taking into consideration the functions of the Responsible Officer as described in IC/74/167 as well as his role in relation to IC/74/86.

4. COMPLETION DATE:

I should be pleased to have the survey initiated as soon as possible and that the results be reported to me by end of September 1975.





(conceptual guidelines only)




COMMUNICATION REQUIREMENTS FOR DRE IN CASE OF A MAJOR DISASTER (PLAN IV)




¹ PHASE 1 through 7 could take place concurrently to a large degree












6. EVALUATION PHASE



Note:

1. The charts above indicate the complexity of co-ordination requirements of DRE.
2. Emphasis is given to ensure close co-operation with UNDRO and League of Red Cross Societies, in particular.
3. Also evident is the fact that DRE requires sufficient authority to ensure speedy actions to be taken by other organizational entities, in order to be responsible for the overall effectiveness of the disaster relief.
4. Comments from ROs, WRS and others would be useful to make the plan a viable one.
5. Tasks of different phases could be undertaken concurrently, as seen below:



Format of Interim Report on Disaster Relief Operation

(under Plan IV)

- 1 Suggested format and data structure of the Interim Report (evaluation report) on each disaster relief operation are given in the following pages.
- 2 By recording the data in a structural way, it becomes possible to compare the cases in quantified terms which are essential for analysing the strength and weakness of the operation and to ensure the viability of the system.
- 3 The same structure should be applied to the Action Master File of each disaster for compiling information by pre-arranged sections. This will facilitate the preparation of the interim report.
- 4 It was assumed that what people wish to know about WHO relief operation in a particular disaster are in essence:
 - a. The speed of operation i.e. how long it took for the first WHO mission or medical supplies to arrive in the area, after declaration of the disaster?
 - b. How large was the total health assistance pledged or donated in relation to WHO's assessment of medical needs, and how much was supplied by or through WHO?
 - c. How much did WHO save by discount on products and free or reduced transport costs?
 - d. Which public health threats were successfully averted?
