

SINDHULI: Immediate assistance demanded

Landslides in Sindhuli district.

The swollen Gaduali river has covered the five and half kilometer long Gaduali river irrigation canal built at a cost of Rs. 2.3 million.

According to chief district officer Ramratan Mishra, landslides have also damaged Sindhuli-Bardibas road at different places.

Repair of the Sindhuli-Bardibas road is expected to take one month. Shortage of essential commodities is being felt in the district.

The district administration has made arrangements for distribution of essential commodities and kerosene through coupons.

Meanwhile, the swollen Kamala River is reported to have swept away the house of Bagare Karki, a resident of ward No. 9 of Hatpate VDC, and 10 cattle.

The floods caused by the Kamala River has affected Nipane, Harshahi, Hatpate and Shishauli VDCs falling under the Dakaha region, according to the regional police offices.

Janakpurdham (RSS) A water pipe worth around Rs. 225,000/- of the Tulsi Chauraha Drinking Water Project has been swept away by the flooded Ratu Stream on the boundary of Dhanusa and Mohottari districts.

According to Dhanusa district drinking water office, the project was only recently completed and water was about to be supplied.
