DEMOGRAPHIC GROWTH IN THE FEDERAL DISTRICT - 1960

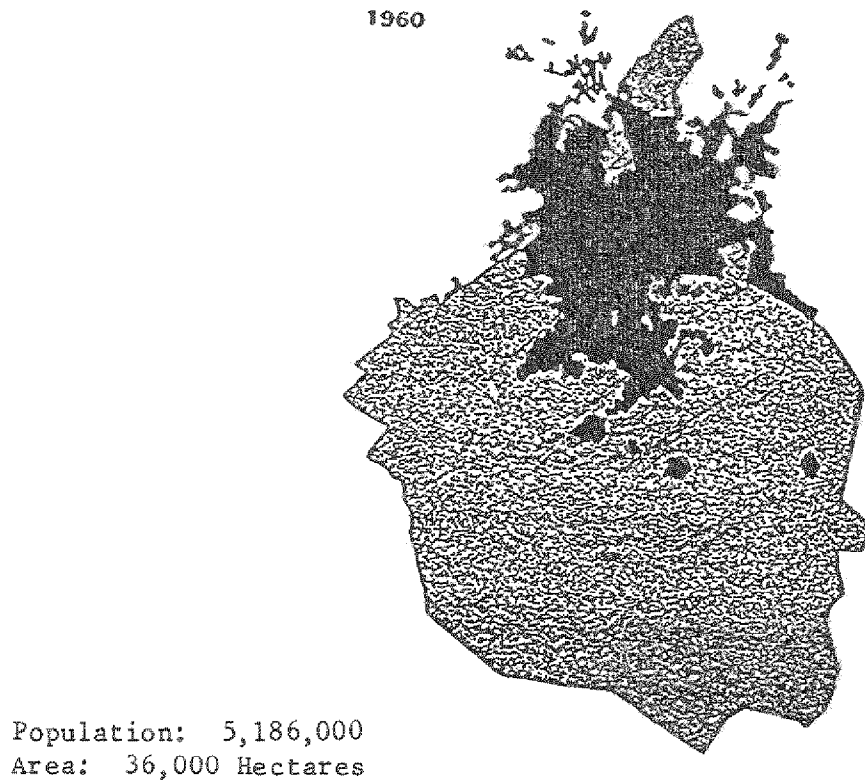
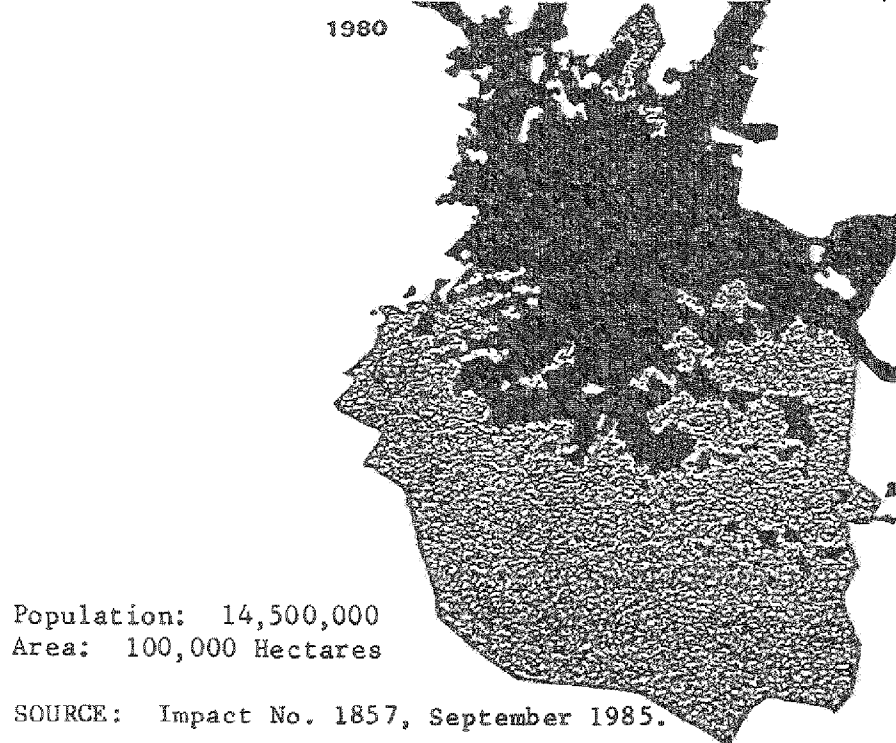

AREA OF THE DISASTER

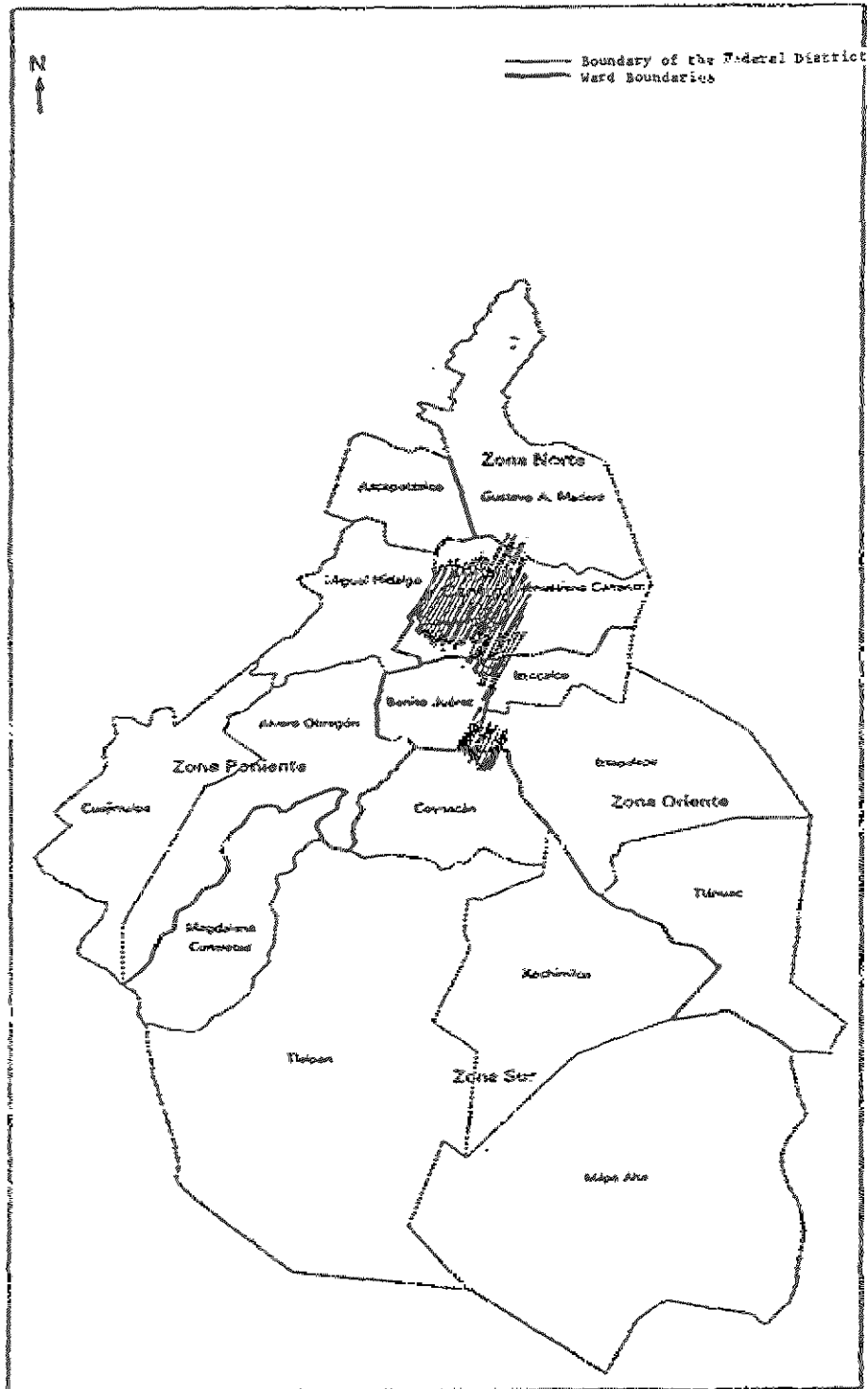

AS OF 27 SEPTEMBER 1985

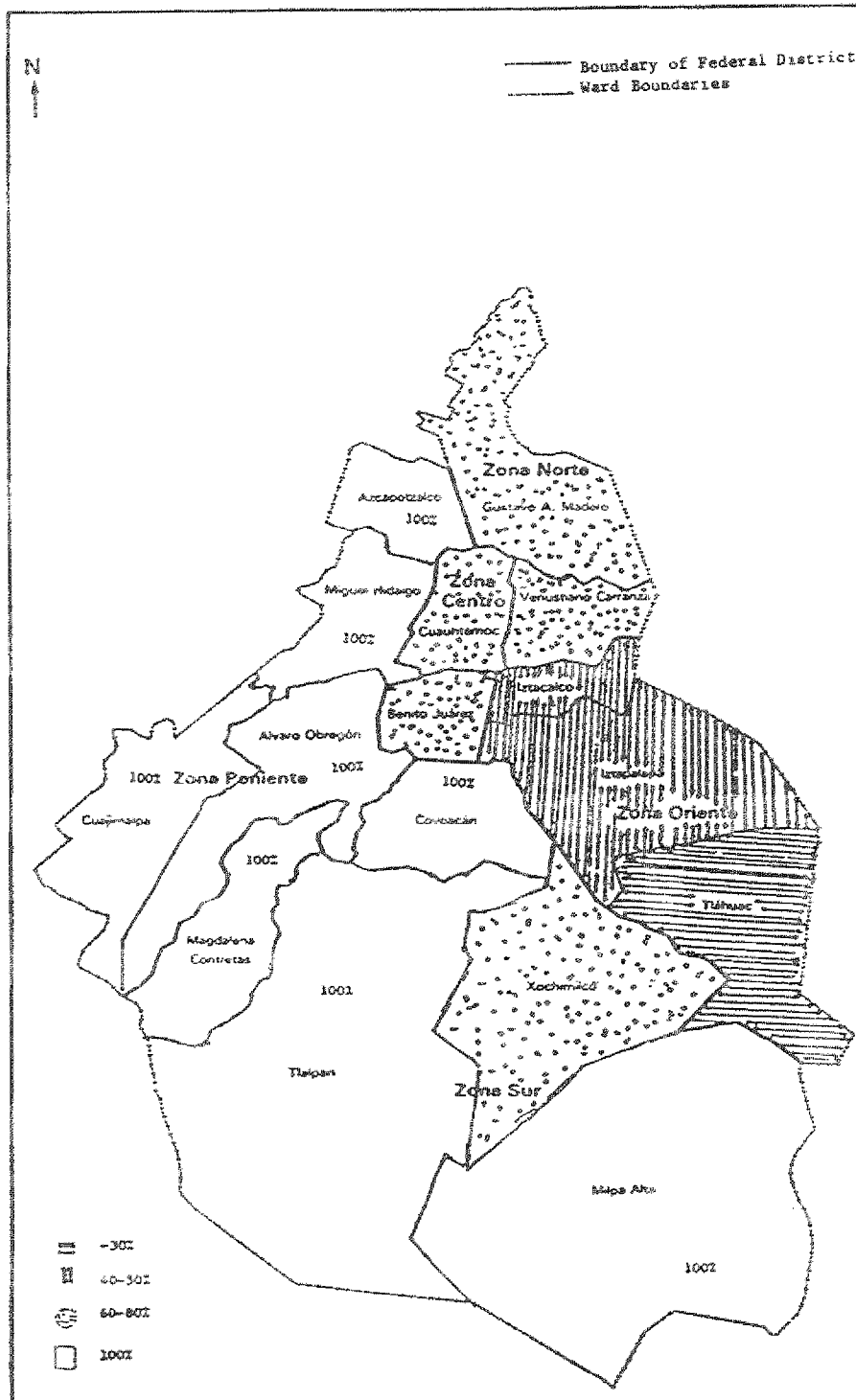

19-23 SEPTEMBER 1985

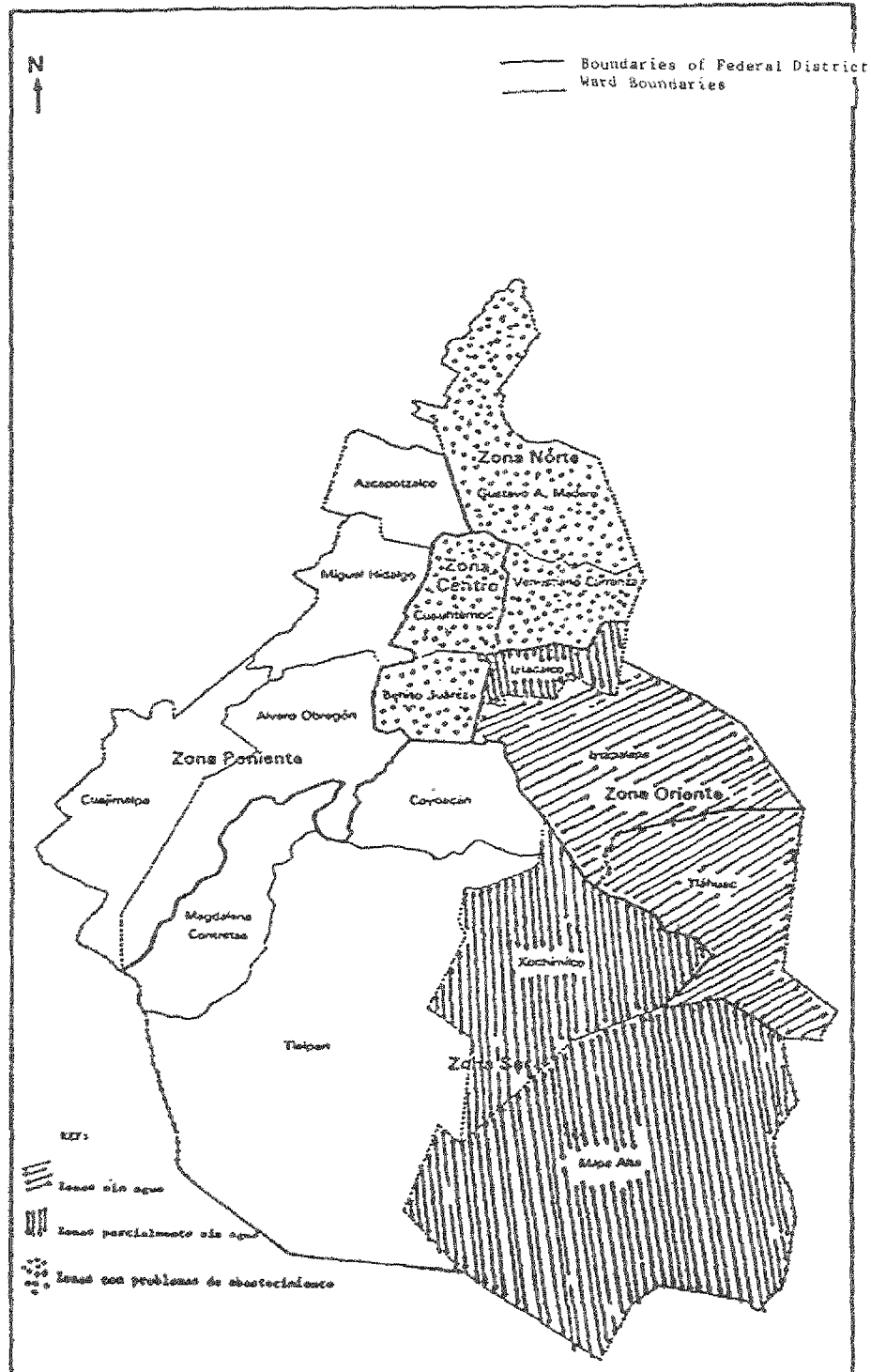

WATER TREATMENT NETWORK

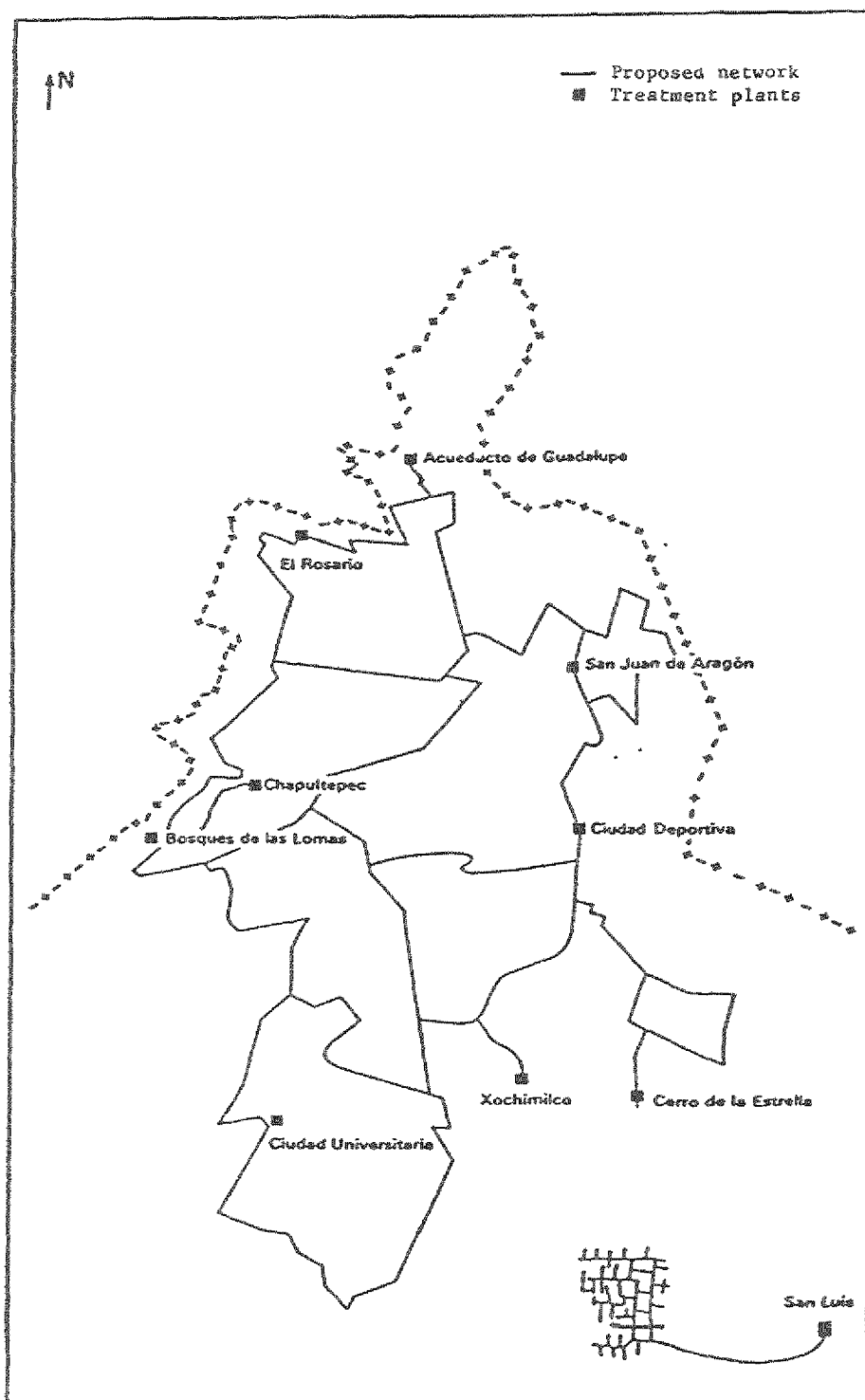
