SUBJECT:

Issuance of Obligation Documents Travel Components - Headquarters Allottees (Ref. PAHO Financial Rules, Article V and Directive No. 86-09)

This Directive establishes the procedures for Headquarters allotment holders (Allottees) to facilitate the issuance of obligation documents which contain travel components. It is also intended to facilitate operations by PAHO/WHO Field Offices in disbursing funds on behalf of Headquarters Allottees.

The provisions of this Directive will become effective 1 May 1987.

I. Short-Term Consultants and Temporary Advisors - Budget Element 040 (UN Funds - Elements 11 and 16)

A. Short-Term Consultants (STC's)

- 1) Funds for STC services are committed through the issuance of a Personnel Authorization (form PAHO 562).
- 2) Headquarters Allottees prepare PAHO 562's in triplicate and submit them to Accounts/Allotment Control (ACC/ALL) for obligation of funds before initiation of processing by APL/CS.
- 3) Allottees will enter under item 13 (Remarks) of PAHO 562 the estimates for a) salary, b) per diem and c) transportation costs.
- 4) If the cost components are not shown separately under item 13, ACC/ALL will establish the obligation using a pre-determined percentage for each component.
- 5) After obligation of funds, ACC/ALL will send the original PAHO 562 with the obligation number to APL/CS for recruitment action. The other copies will be retained by ACC/ALL and the Budget Office (ABU).

ACC/ALL will return the PAHO 562 to the originating Allottee when there are not sufficient funds available for obligation or when the form is incomplete.

REPORT

Report on the Digmam of Emergency Preparedness and Disaster Relief Coordination Caribbean Region 1987

The Objectives and activities of the Program of Emergency Proparedness and Disantor Rollof in the Carthboan Region are in consonance with the Program components and major activities at Regional Level.

- 1. Program Management
- 1.1. Organization Structure
 Organizationally, in the Caribbean Region the PABO
 program of Emergency Preparedness and Disaster Relief
 Coordination is one of three components of the
 UNDRO Administered Pan Caribbean Disaster Preparedness
 and Prevention Project the other two components being
 UNDRO and the Red Cross. The Organizational relationships
 of the PAHO Health Advisor are to the Project Manager of
 PCDPPP, the PAHO Caribbean Program Coordinator in Barbados,
 the PED Regional Advisor in Washington and the PWRs of
 Caribbean countries.
- 1.2. Intersectoral Coordination
 Closer liaison has been achieved with National Coordinators responsibly for Disaster Management in their respective countries and also with key sectors eg. Civil Defence Fire, Police and other response agencies.
- 1.3. Interagency Coordination
 A concerted effort has been made to hold discussions and collaborate with personnel from international agencies within the Subregion Red Cross and other NCOs to determine and clarify their roles and also to interpret PAHO's role in Disaster Management.
- 1.4. Cooperation with Non English Speaking Territories
 Efforts were made to establish greater cooperation with the
 Non-English speaking countries. A team including staff
 members from UNDRO, Red Cross and PAHO visited Puerto Rico,
 Santo Domingo and Haiti. Opportunity was taken to present
 the role of the PAHO component of PCDPPP and advise on the
 availability of technical cooperation and assistance.
 The visits were well received and since then there have
 been several requests from those countries for Lochnical
 material and information.

Through the CPC Office Barbados links have been established with National Authorities in Guadeloupe, Martinique and French Guiana.

1.5. Technological Support

The Communication network between Washington, Barbados and Antigua has been strengthened with the addition of Facsimile machines to PCDPPP and CPC Office in Barbados.

1.6. Staff Training

- 1.6.1. Staff Orientation Sessions in Disaster Management PAHO staff including PWRs, CFNI and CAREC participated in orientation sessions on Disaster Management in three locations namely: Jamaica, Barbados, and Trinidad.
- 1.6.2. Staff Development
 Staff members in the Antigua Office both professional and general participated in technical courses on disaster management and also computer training.
- 2. Education/Training Material
- 2.1. Information Centre

Requests for information are being met more speedily and efficiently with the appointment of an Associate Professional Officer to the program who has assisted in the Organization of existing material for the health sector.

Systematically, lists of available education/training material, audio visual aids etc are sent to national authorities, interested individuals and organizations.

The concept of a documentation centre or central place for shelving information on Disaster Management at national level where persons can have ready access to the material when required has been actively pursued.

2.2. Mailing List

The PAHO mailing list for the Sub region has been a expanded and updated. The structure of the mailing list is compatible with those of PCDPPP and the Regional Office.

2.3. Audio-Visual Material

The optimum use of PAHO audio-visual material has been promoted. Several requests for copies of specific video tapes have been made by countries.

New slides dealing with Hospital Management and Water Supply were reviewed and distributed.

3. <u>Support to National Programs</u>
It is recognised that one of the constraints in some countries to an effective Disaster Management program might

The use of quarterly cost estimates and quarterly travel authorizations is under the responsibility of the Allottees.

III. Contractual Services - Budget Element 390 (UN Funds-21)

- Travel entitlements and method of payment for per diem, transportation and related expenses for those individuals who are employed under Contractual Service Agreements and required to travel will be clearly specified in their contracts.
- 2) Allottees control the travel of contract employees through the issuance of separate Travel Authorizations, form PAHO 180.
- 3) Travel Authorizations issued for contractual services personnel will include the contract number and allotment and obligation numbers assigned by ACC/ALL to the original contract document. This obligation number will be used to control all costs incurred under the contract including travel.
- 4) To change the original obligation of funds in respect of travel, a revised Travel Authorization will be submitted to ACC/ALL.

IV. Local Courses, Seminars and Workshops and International Seminars Budget Element 820 (UN Funds-32)

A. Local Courses, Seminars and Workshops

- Headquarters Allottees who wish to conduct national courses and/or locally sponsored seminars and workshops submit requests for obligation of funds to AFI/SEM together with the estimated cost of each activity.
- 2) AFI/SEM obtains the obligation number from ACC/ALL and authorizes the responsible PAHO/WHO Field Office to disburse funds. Such authorizations will indicate obligation and allotment numbers. AFI/SEM forwards copies of all authorizations to the Allottee and other participating offices.

B. International Seminars

- Obligation of funds for participants at international seminars financed by Headquarters allotments are normally established on the basis of Collective Travel Authorizations prepared by Allottees.
- 2) Allottees submit the Collective Travel Authorizations to AFI/SEM. This office arranges for the obligation of funds and assists the Allottee with respect to ticket issuance and per diem payments.

3.3.3. Training at Regional and International Institutions

The number of persons attending courses at regional and/or international institutions is not known since in many instances arrangements for training of personnel are made directly between PWRs and the Regional office. There is need for a mechanism to ensure that information in relation to training of personnel flows to the sub regional office in Antigua.

- 3.4 Second Annual Health Coordinators Meeting
 The second annual Health Coordinators Meeting was held
 June 1 3 1987 in Barbados. The purpose of the meeting
 was to report on progress in the National Programs,
 evaluate short falls and identify areas for PAHO technical
 cooperation. Opportunity was also taken to use one day of
 the meeting as an a teaching/learning activity. At this
 meeting the Mental Health aspects of Disasters were
 addressed. It is hoped that this trend will continue for
 subsequent meetings.
- 3.5 Support in Terms of Supplies and Equipment
 Support in terms of First Aid bones for the district level
 has been provided to Dominica.
- 3.6 Integration of Disaster Management in the Curricula for Health Professionals

 Discussions were held with the Faculty of Health Sciences University of Guyana in relation to the integration of Disaster Management into the Curricula for Health Science Professionals.

Disaster Management has been integrated into the Curricula for professional nursing and is being implemented in several countries.

- 3.7 <u>Infusion of Disaster Management Concepts in the School Curriculum</u>
 PAHO participated in a planning meeting including representatives from general Education, the Caribbean Examination Council, Faculty of Education, University of the West Indies, for the "Infusion of Disaster Management Concepts in Schools Curriculum"
- 4. Mass Casualty Management
- 4.1. Regional Plan for Mass Casualty Management
 The Report of the feasibility study for a Regional Mass
 Casualty Management Plan mandated by Caricom Health
 Ministers in 1984, was circulated to National Authorities
 in the Ministries of Health.

The Subject of Emergency Health Management after Natural Disaster was included in the Caribbean Health Communication Roundtable held in Barbados November 1987. At this meeting aspects of disaster management and the role of the Media in shaping public opinion both prior to and in the immediate aftermath of a disaster was discussed.

The Video on "Myths and Realities of Natural Disasters" produced by the Regional Office was presented for the first time. There was consensus that this video was suitable for dispelling myths associated with disasters and was relevant for use by any audience.

8. Conclusion

Since the appointment of the new Project Manager to PCDPPP in August 1987, Program activities have increased to meet the needs of member states. PAHO has participated in the planning of the overall program of PCDPPP for 1988 and is committed to collaboration in the implementation of activities requiring PAHO input.

One of the objectives of the PAHO component is to strengthen national programs, increase national self reliance and utilize available human resources with the necessary expertise to the maximum. Towards this end the concept of technical cooperation among countries is being fostered particularly in relation to the education/training of personnel in the Sub-Region.

- Updating and Expanding the Mailing list to include health related personnel in English and Non-English Speaking Caribbean

- Distribution of PAHO bulletins in English, Spanish and French, scientific/technical material, audio visual material
- Reproduction of material and audio visual as required
- 4. <u>UWIDITE Program on Disaster Management</u> sponsored by PAHO and transmitted to health personnel in seven locations namely:

Antigua and Barbuda Barbados

Dominica Grenada

Kingston/Montego Bay St. Lucia

Trinidad & Tobago

- Evaluation of Program with possible adjustment at more advanced level.
- 5. Regional Training of Trainers Course in Environmental Health which will be replicated at National Level.
 - Information will be provided at all Training Courses on the optimum use of PAHO resources

6. Collaboration in Intersectoral Activities

- Red Cross and Non-Governmental Organizations including media, civil defence etc.
- General education e.g infusion of disaster concepts in school curriculum

7. Post Disaster Needs Assessment

- Training of health personnel on emergency needs assessment,
 managing information and coordinating relief efforts
- PAHO Disaster Response Team to assist national authorities and PAHO local staff to collect, interpret, and disseminate data on health needs and priorities so that appropriate resources are provided.

- 9. Participate/Initiate Operational Research
 - Review of Disaster events
- 10. Evaluation of Training activities in terms of impact.
