Incidents precipitated by human error, negligence, or deliberate intent can produce devastating effects on human lives and property. Death and destruction frequently accompany such diverse person-caused disasters as building collapses, airplane crashes, and acts of terrorism. Civil disorders, as experienced in the past two decades, often result in arson, looting, assault, and murder. The electrical power outage which paralyzed New York City in 1977 caused countless residents, employees, and visitors to be stranded in high-rise buildings, elevators, trains, and subways. This blackout resulted in hundreds of injuries to citizens and emergency personnel and caused over \$150 million worth of property damage.

There is no evidence to suggest that person-caused disasters will diminish during the present decade. Rather, more incidents can be expected. To manage those incidents which may occur, local officials need to identify their community's risks and develop appropriate pre-emergency plans.

Planning efforts for person-caused disasters require cooperation and coordination among local emergency response organizations. In particular, police, fire, and emergency medical agencies need to establish cooperative efforts for managing an incident.

The management of person-caused disasters, while similar to other emergencies and disasters, may require some specialized actions. Often, it is necessary for emergency personnel to perform mass evacuations from areas such as high-rise buildings, transportation modes, or medical facilities. Preplanning for these types of evacuations is essential. Another important effort is the identification of personnel and equipment resources. Civil disorders and airplane crashes, for example, may require a callback of off-duty personnel. Mutual aid agreements can also be critical in these types of incidents.

Many person-caused disasters require specialized rescue equipment such as cranes. Inventories of equipment availability and location should be undertaken. As appropriate, arrangements may be needed with local towing and construction companies. Resource lists identifying the equipment and organizations should be prepared. Electric power outages require the availability of backup generators. Their availability and location should be determined in advance.

Training of emergency personnel is essential in planning efforts. Several of the communities surveyed indicated that they had training programs for high-rise rescue and building collapses. In addition, subsequent to the numerous racial, student, and prison riots that occurred beginning in Los Angeles in 1965, many agencies have developed specialized training efforts for civil disorders. Some of the training activities consist of simulated exercises.

Fire and rescue response teams are generally employed for person-caused disasters. Several communities also have explosives handling units and Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) teams. The City of Miami's SWAT team consists of police officers and paramedics. Other communities equip their emergency response personnel with chemical shields or bullet-proof vests. The Miami Fire Department also has a special tactics team, which is trained and equipped to respond to a variety of incidents.

Following the actions of the Los Angeles Fire Department in 1965, many fire departments, in the event of a civil disorder, organize their response units into task force configurations. Police units are frequently requested to provide incident verification and escort for fire and emergency medical units.

Response times in many person-caused disasters may be delayed. It may be difficult in a civil disorder, terrorist incident, or power outage to adhere to normal response times. Environmental considerations can affect emergency response in these situations. The life safety conditions of emergency responders must also be considered.

Based on the survey responses, many communities have prepared a single response plan for person-caused and natural disasters. These plans are frequently annexed to city/county plans. Several respondents, though, indicated that they had developed specialized response plans for civil disorders. The Miami, Florida Fire Department, which protects 34 square miles and a population of 365,000, has a comprehensive plan describing the organization and operation of the fire department in the event of a civil disorder. The "Civil Disturbance Plan" was activated during the May 1980 civil disorder.

Only a few communities have developed training manuals for person-caused disasters. These manuals are primarily oriented to civil disorders.

Various experienced individuals and organizations are available to assist local officials in their preplanning efforts. The California Specialized Training Institute, a California state agency, provides courses in the management of civil disorders and terrorism. The "Civil Disorder Management Course" is designed for those persons involved in planning emergency response. It is a 44-hour course that includes simulated exercises. A 40-hour "Terrorism Course" is designed for public and private organizations. Specific topics include investigative management and target and vulnerability assessment.
