












Engineering solutions by Leonardo da Vinci

By sharing information on lessons learned and experience gained in developing and refining practical tools for disaster management, I believe we are furthering a coordinated and coherent response to these emergencies.

The international community has learned that a number of tools must be in place even before disasters occur. Given the need to respond immediately in face of calamity, the delivery of humanitarian assistance can not be subject to the slightest delay. We have therefore developed measures to facilitate customs approvals and have also employed civil defense and military assets to reinforce the response capacity of the United Nations. We have also striven to enhance cooperation among the many actors involved in accurately assessing relief needs and promptly delivering coordinated assistance.

While we aim to work together to respond to the pressing needs of the affected population, we must also strengthen our ability to reduce human

suffering and material destruction by developing strategies for prevention and rehabilitation. Constructing earthquake or cyclone-resistant buildings, for instance, does not cost much more than erecting traditional structures, but this can save lives when disaster strikes.

Involving local populations in planning measures to increase their self-reliance is another key element in a successful disaster response. This calls for training and education, without which even the most sophisticated techniques would be useless. Teaching school children to draw a map of the area in which they live, indicating hazards and pointing out strengths and weaknesses of the community, is a simple but effective way to promote self-reliance and to anticipate natural disasters.

In developing new tools and enhancing those already in place, we are strengthening our capacity to work together for a safer environment and a better future for much of the world's population.
